A golden start to 2024

Dear Parents, Carers, Governors, Friends, Staff and Pupils



We are delighted to inform you that Molescroft Primary School has once again been awarded an Artsmark Gold Award. The following report is from Arts Council England.

"Your Statement of Commitment and Statement of Impact have been assessed and we're pleased to share this feedback from our assessors with you:

'Despite the limitations of Covid Molescroft Primary School has maintained a strong arts offer which draws on internal expertise of confident teachers and external partners. It was great to read that your valuing the arts led you to nominate 'Art' as a focal point for a recent Ofsted 'deep dive' and that the inspection was successful. Having to advocate for the positive influence arts-rich approaches to teaching and learning can have on broader attitudes to schooling among pupils, as well as the specific skills and knowledge it helps to foster, makes the role of the arts and creativity a more credible lever for change to anyone who brings external scrutiny to educational settings. It was good to hear you did this so well. Your arts coordinators are helping to pause and reflect on units of work and the way the curriculum can offer richer learning experiences if

offer richer learning experiences if approached in new ways - you rewrote your textiles curriculum as a result of such reflections. You are also placing emphasis on how the arts can foster a sense of a school's place in the wider community. For example, you have displayed work in local galleries: your jubilee portraits have been displayed in a local care home and sold during your Charity Fundraising Fortnight. What is it about being an arts-rich setting that feeds into the day-to-day culture of teaching and learning, and how does that make a positive difference. Having clear ideas about how your approach is effective makes it more shareable with schools and artist partners.'

CHARITY FUNDRAISING

A NEW RECORD

One of the amazing achievements of the year has been the pupils' charity fundraising campaign, supported as always by our thoughtful and generous community. The total raised was once again a record amount compared to comparative years. £10101.02. The campaign started in October, with elements to make it easier on families and hopefully to reduce any pressures, real or felt. The response has been astonishing. The cause clearly resonated with the children and the community.

The fundraising is astonishing and includes £3,574.87raised through sponsorship activities and the value of goods donated to help provide 218 gift baskets for people living with dementia in our community.

Our final assembly In December was a magical, celebratory, fun and emotional end to a wonderful Christmas Time at Molescroft Primary School.

At the end of our Special Assembly, 218 sensory baskets and 11 perfect petzzs (breathing toy cats and dogs) were brought into the hall, before being sent to care homes around Beverley. Mrs. Julie McKay from The Old School House Care Home, attended the assembly on behalf of the homes in the area and



was moved by what she witnessed. She is also an 'old mole'; a teaching assistant who left us 15 years ago.

The combined generosity, ingenuity, enterprise, care and kindness of this community never ceases to amaze me. In days of despair, concern and financial restraint, there is a bright light shining from Molescroft into the night sky. I hope there were a few more stars

shining from bedrooms on Christmas Eve as well!

Thank you as always for your support and partnership, thank you to every one of the staff for their selfless dedication to this school and all our wonderful Moles. Here's to a year ahead of healing, in this fractured world. Charity in Britain is alive and well and recognises that whatever the situation, the most vulnerable should be protected and that we can still make a difference. I look forward to welcoming a representative from the Alzheimer's Society to receive a substantial check from the children.

PE IN THE WINTER Keeping warm in outdoor PE for Y1 to Y6

Parents may recall that I announced because of the MUGA we can now ensure PE sessions can occur inside **and outside** throughout the year.

This means that children will need in addition to their black PE kit clothes to keep them warm.

Some children have already been a bit chilly in outdoor PE as they didn't have anything warm to wear.

Warm jogging bottoms and tops are probably the most useful. Also it is vital (except the FY) that children have a pair of trainers to wear which must not be the pair that they may be wearing in school.

SNOW POLICY: IMPORTANT

The following is taken from the school's Safeguarding Policy and should prepare parents/carers for what to expect when it snows.

The school will only close without prior notice as a last resort. The Head Teacher or his representative will remain on site until the last child is collected.

Policy in Practice What the school does to assist in the event of icy weather conditions.

It is not practical to grit the entire site, but as part of the gritting policy, safe routes round the site and across the South Playground have been identified and will be gritted before giving access to the site, thereby minimising the risks to children parents and visitors. The car park will also be gritted.

Children are not allowed to make slides on the playgrounds. Playgrounds are gritted if practical before 8:30am and when not, by morning break. At playtimes a decision as to whether children are to be allowed outside will be made by the senior teacher on duty in conjunction with a member of the Senior Management Team.

Children may not throw snowballs on the playgrounds. However if the field is covered by thick snow pupils may be allowed to play on the field in the snow, make snowman and throw snowballs. Those not wishing to throw snow (or indeed be hit by snowballs) should stay on the playgrounds. The school believes that playing in and throwing snow is part of a child's life experiences.

In extreme cases the Headteacher may decide that there is no option but to close the school if there is presented a severe health and safety risk. This done, the Chair of

Governors will be informed and parents via text message. A severe Health and Safety Risk would be presented if insufficient staff could reach the school or indeed the health and safety of staff meant that they should leave early. Due to the location of the school it is expected that the school will be able to remain open. Closing a school at short notice including closing mid way through a day poses considerable difficulties for parents and will only be taken as a very last resort.

A complete heating failure in the winter and/or a loss of the water supply would however result in the school having to close.

Good communication is essential. Parents receive a copy of specific instructions during the autumn and winter months via the monthly newsletters and the website. Children have the processes explained to them in the classroom. It is expected that parents adhere to these instructions and pass all relevant information to friends and relatives who may also come to school to bring and fetch children. Parents/Carers are asked to be responsible and plan more time for their journey, suitable footwear for having to walk further, wrapping up to keep warm etc....Parents should not expect to be able to park close to the school at these times! Parents and visitors are expected to use the gritted paths rather than walk across the snow and ice.

Snow Policy and Procedures - information for teaching and support staff

In the event of disruption caused by heavy snow the prime concern of the school must always be the safety of the pupils and staff.

It is expected that all staff will make every reasonable effort to undertake the journey to school. It is appreciated that the journey may take longer than normal and therefore some staff may not be able to arrive before the normal start of school time.



The school will only close without prior notice as a last resort. The Head Teacher or his representative will remain on site until the last child is collected.

In the event of severe weather, a decision to close the school for pupils will be made by 7am. The Head Teacher will make arrangements for PARENTS TO BE INFORMED BY TEXT IF THE SCHOOL IS TO CLOSE.

In the event of the normal timetable being suspended, a programme of activities will be organised for pupils who arrive at school. Teachers and Teaching Assistants will be delegated to supervise these activities.

Rather than a full closure it is more likely that the school will remain open on a reduced capacity. In such an event, parents/carers will be asked if it is possible to make alternative arrangements for pupils. Where this is not possible the school will remain open for those who need to come to school or for those who cannot go home in the case of an unexpected early closure. As the number pupils remaining decreases, they will be moved to other classes or the hall.

IF YOU ARE RUNNING LATE. A request

Traffic seems to be getting worse around Beverley and on routes to the town from all directions.

Understandably, parents and carers will find themselves stuck in the traffic and in danger of not making the pick up time.

If you think this may apply please can you phone the school before 3:15pm. Recently a number of calls arriving near to 3:30pm have led to the office team unable to get to all the classrooms in time. We do not have an internal intercom system.

Your understanding would be most appreciated.

In addition please remind your children that they must not leave the premises with anyone other than the adult scheduled to pick them up.

Any changes to these arrangements can only be communicated via a member of staff.

PARKING GOOD BEHAVIOUR

Restrictions apply, sun or rain.

I wish to remind drivers not to park or drop off in the cul-de-sac which dangerously mixes vehicles with hundreds of children entering or leaving the school. I also thank drivers for not parking on the yellow lines on St. Leonard's Road or on Molescroft Avenue, which keeps the view clear of the crossing patrol.

Furthermore, thanks are extended to those with disabled badges who park as far away as they find possible from the crossing patrol.

However, it only needs one car to cause a disruption. Please can I ask all parents to remind others e.g. grandparents, of the parking expectations.

Please remember that all these measures are designed to protect your children. A zero tolerance to infringement ensures that we keep the area safe. Turning a blind eye only ends up with the situations we see often on the news at other schools across the country.



Thank you for keeping the road clear with no parking and not using the cul-de-sac.

This is just as important on wet days.

I would prefer not to have to personally discuss issues with drivers.

As a relief Crossing Patrol Officer myself, I understand first hand how difficult it can become when cars are parked near the crossing patrol. The result is a reduction of visibility and often backing up of vehicles unable to move forward. On the vast majority of occasions however the road has been completely clear, even on a wet day.

I am sure everyone understands that those crossing must keep

moving swiftly past Mr. Platten and Mr. Williams, and at a suitable distance. I also remind everyone not to cross behind him. It is actually quite a complex crossing and is hindered by those crossing behind the crossing patrol officer. The need to park properly is just as important in wet weather as it is on a sunny day.

School Meals are Excellent Value.

Our restaurant is open to adult guests at lunchtime. Meals cost £3.90 to be paid online. Numbers will be limited to 12 per day, but it is possible to book in advance. The latest booking is 9:30am each morning and guests should report to the reception at 11:50am. Children will come down to join guests at 11:55am. Please make sure your child(ren) know to come down to the hall. Adult guests cannot join us in the first week of the school year, on sporting tournament days, during the Theatre Club week and prior to it or in the last week before the Christmas holiday.

A child's meal costs £2.90. (A full week offer of £11.60, £8.70 for a four day week.) It is excellent value, and by educating children away from a diet of crisps and processed food we are together building a lifetime of good eating habits and healthy hearts. DINNERS MUST BE PREPAID, no more than £2.90 will be accepted in arrears. Dinners should ideally be paid for on line at School Money.

Meals are advertised on the website and there is usually the salad with two wraps option and the Jacket Potato with a range of fillings. Children can self-serve salad, vegetables and fruit salad and can have second portions. Year 4, 5 & 6 pupils may have a larger portion of the advertised main hot meal. Monday hot meals are meat free unless a special occasion.
